This means once our places are filled with successful applicants, we are unable to offer any further places. Early application is therefore encouraged.





Should I have experience working in a primary school before applying?

School experience is required for the TTSA's School Direct programme. We strongly advise that this is gained prior to interview as it will support answers to key questions, and of course is a vital part of confirming that teaching is the career for you! Please note, we can support your work experience including through our Taster Days and placements - please contact us for further information.

Core aspects of the programme include:

- Placement in a high-quality school with support from a dedicated mentor, with a different experience in a second placement school. This gives you a contrasting experience, and develops your knowledge.
- Weekly learning and training, with assignments. As well as securing your QTS, you will achieve a PGCE with 90 credits towards a Masters qualification. You will cover all aspects of education and pedagogy in your training. Some examples include behaviour for learning, how to prepare, plan and structure lessons, questioning techniques, demonstrating progress and co-operative learning strategies.
- Secondary and early years experience. These enhance your wider knowledge around areas such as transition.

- Study in all aspects of what makes a successful teacher. This will include the National Curriculum and important aspects such as Special Educational Needs (SEN), managing stress and achieving a work-life balance.
- You will learn alongside fellow primary trainees, within small groups. Your teaching load increases in line with your learning, giving you the confidence you need to succeed.
- Learning is delivered through workshops, tutorials and lectures, some with guest speakers, and through group work with other teacher trainees from a variety of subject specialisms.

Do you need a degree in the subject you wish to teach?

If you do not have a degree in the subject you wish to teach, a Subject Knowledge Enhancement (SKE) programme can help. Your degree can be in any subject, as long as it meets the generic entry requirements (see page 9). All of the programme concentrates on ensuring you have the right subject knowledge, but SKE funding supports shortage subjects such as Maths, Physics, Chemistry and Languages. They are also widely available in other subjects including Computer Science and Geography - contact us for details!

Case study: Why I chose the TTSA

Aaron Waterworth will commence the programme in September 2017 and is training to teach History. Here he shares more about why he applied to train with the TTSA.

"The opportunity to help change a student's life and encourage a love of learning was too good to pass up. I've wanted to teach for as long as I can remember and part of it was inspired by my own teachers when I was in school who made learning engaging and fun! I just hope I too can inspire the next generation. The TTSA's opportunities for a school based approach to teacher training really appealed to me.

Since graduating with a History and Politics degree back in 2013 I have been working in education. I started as a Learning Assistant but for the last year and a half I have been working as a Cover Supervisor. This has given me a really helpful insight into different aspects of the classroom and a fantastic opportunity to observe the different teaching techniques of some truly brilliant teachers.

Starting something new especially if you're leaving something you've done

for a while can be daunting for anyone, but nothing great is ever achieved by standing still. Being nervous or worried just means you're about to start something important that you care about! Throw everything into it and be open to help from others and you'll do fine."

Where will my training be completed?

We work with a wide range of partner schools to deliver our School Direct training. Each school has its own unique features, but all are involved with the alliance because they want to play their part in training – and then hopefully recruiting – the outstanding teachers of the future.

When you are offered a place with us you will be placed in one of our schools for your main placement. Placements are assigned on the basis of a range of factors including your home location. If you would like to train with the TTSA but either have a particular school in mind or need one closer to home, then please contact us to see if we can help.



Application criteria

The TTSA is looking to recruit trainee primary and secondary teachers with the potential to become outstanding. As an alliance, we support you on the journey to achieving this.

Applications are initially made via UCAS; should you meet the minimum criteria, you will be invited to interview with our panel.

The minimum requirements are detailed below. Please do contact us for further information, advice and support.

Qualifications and experience:

- Degree 2:2 or above (or equivalent).
- Minimum of five A*- C grade GCSEs at grade C or above including Mathematics, English Language and Science.
- Strong subject knowledge.
- Knowledge of issues linked to education.
- Relevant school based experience, either in a paid or voluntary capacity.

Personal qualities:

- Enjoyment of working with children and young people.
- Commitment to a career in teaching.
- Reflection on previous experience in school.
- Effective communication skills including use of written and spoken English.
- Excellent interpersonal skills.
- Leadership potential.
- Initiative.
- Ability to relate to and engage with young people.
- Display a range of personal characteristics including flexibility, communication, independence and resilience.
- Ability to explain concepts clearly.
- Ability to work effectively as part of a group.
- *Trainees must commence the programme as planned or will be invoiced for the workshop cost. Those who apply to the TTSA following a workshop will have the workshop cost refunded.


In addition all applicants will also need to:

- Demonstrate a passion for working with young people, not just a passion for their subject(s).
- Be able to evidence why teaching is the right career for them
- Have successfully completed the Professional Skills' tests in Literacy and Numeracy. Information regarding this can be found at: www.education.gov.uk/get-into-teaching
- Complete a declaration regarding any criminal convictions, have a satisfactory Disclosure and Barring Service check (DBS) and satisfactory references, ensuring their suitability to work with young people.

Help with the Professional Skills Test

All trainees must pass the Professional Skills
Test in order to commence the programme.
This evidences that the minimum standards
in numeracy and literacy have been met.
The TTSA offers three separate numeracy
and literacy workshops which ensures that
trainees can sit the tests with confidence. For
those who make the TTSA their first choice
of trainer and are subsequently offered a
place, these workshops are free.*

Train to teach: financial and bespoke support

School Direct is an investment in your future and the start of your future career. We understand that you may be leaving paid employment to train, and there is a range of financial and other support available from the TTSA.

Salaried places

Our salaried places are funded by the Government, and therefore are linked to subjects that are considered to need to attract more high-calibre professionals to teach them. In 2018 we expect that our salaried places will include Maths, Physics and Chemistry. We also offer a smaller number of English salaried places. These are highly competitive, and early application is advised.

Government attach set criteria to these posts including a minimum of an A-level in the subject (or equivalent experience e.g. accountancy would be considered equivalent experience to a Maths A-level). You must also have at least three years' work experience.

There are a range of attractive bursaries available, and we recommend that you contact us without obligation to discuss these and receive support with your application. Please note that with the range of support available for some unsalaried places, it is often worth researching both routes - please contact us of you require further advice and support.

Help with the costs of tuition and living expenses

A School Direct place costs £9,250, and is payable in three instalments across the academic year. Payments are made

Some of the additional ways we support trainees include:

- Pre-placement induction. We run a special induction session prior to the summer where you will meet some of your colleagues and learn more about the year ahead.
- Employment support. All of our trainees are highly employable, and our partners take part in the programme as part of their own recruitment strategies. Nine in ten trainees on average secure employment prior to course completion.
- A dedicated team of staff. We understand that it can feel like a big decision to train to teach. We support our trainees on every step of their journey from pre-application to training and starting their first teaching role.

Jess Axton is a current salaried trainee. Here she reveals more about being a 'career changer'. Jess has taken advantage of the TTSA's ability to organise work experience.

"I am training to teach secondary maths as a salaried trainee. I have always enjoyed numbers, patterns and logic puzzles and feel maths is the subject for me. I am a 'career changer,' having already started one career and spent five years at university. The fact that School Direct is 'on the job' learning and that you can get involved from day one really appealed to me.

I left a position as a primary school Maths Teaching Assistant to train to teach. This has given me the opportunity to be part of a teaching team and to begin taking some lessons in a school environment. Prior to this I was a trained doctor and worked as a junior doctor in hospitals. However, I was not happy working as a doctor, and although leaving a career might be daunting, I believe you should do what makes you happy. I wanted a job that is inspiring, where you continue to learn, and one in which you can give back to a community. One piece of advice I would give is to undertake some work

experience. This is an important part of ensuring that you definitely know that teaching is the career for you.

I am looking forward to getting started, getting involved and trying new ideas and lessons in a classroom environment."
